Using the Right Tools:

Hardware - Find what's available:

- ♦ Hold a meeting at a member's workplace or local library to use their LCD Projector
- Buy an inexpensive overhead projector or use one at the library
- ♦ Turn an older TV into a big computer monitor with PC-to-TV Converters found at most electronic stores
- ♦ Hook up your laptop directly to a newer TV with an S-video or HDMI cord
- Dry Erase boards are great for games and making lists
- Dry Erase boards with a large pad of paper attached can be used for homemade flipchart lessons
- Props Nothing makes a statement like a prop! (Ben Bernanke's face glued to an Uncle Ben's box, inexpensive "door prizes" for a job well done, like Jim Cramer coffee cups, bulls, bears or hogs; decks of cards with dollar signs; dollar sign key chains, etc.)

Examples of lessons from scratch:

- <u>Finding good quality companies</u> have members search their homes for labels (under kitchen sink, in the medicine chest, pantry, linen closet, chest of drawers, garage, etc.); make a list; research online to see if they are public companies; bring a list of those that meet the club's criteria.
- ♦ How to use your club's tools It's an ongoing process to educate member on the use of analysis software and websites; how to research a stock or listen to a conference call, how to be a stock watcher, etc. Design your program around the ideas that will improve your investing results.
- ♦ Interpret Financial Results Use a Letter to the Shareholder or the business section of a 10K to help improve members' interpretation of company results by having each member read the same piece and note the most important takeaways. Have them go around the room and share them. It will help the newer members learn what to look for.
- ♦ <u>Understanding the accounting reports</u> Use the online manuals on <u>www.myiclub.com</u> or <u>www.bivio.com</u> to generate lessons on reading valuation statements and performance reports.
- ◆ <u>Learn about Sectors</u> This is a good exercise for clubs that rotate education. There's a wealth of information on the internet on industries, such as banks, retail companies, healthcare, etc. S&P Net Advantage has detailed industry surveys available on over 50 industries These can be found online at your local library.
- ♦ <u>Annual reports</u> Always a mystery. Use Bob Adams' Annual Report Analyzer worksheets (URL elsewhere in handout) or use the online version at <u>www.stockcentral.com</u> under Tools (\$). Very cool! Very educational!
- ◆ <u>Dictionaries</u> Create short, effective education sessions out of words or phrases. A favorite dictionary is Wall Street Words. Not only does it define a word or phrase, but it also explains the concept behind it.
- Monthly Stock to Study This is a quick lesson for club members who receive BetterInvesting Magazine. All members must complete a Stock Selection Guide (SSG) or other analysis on the monthly featured stock. Then everyone explains how they chose their judgments. Any stock can be used for this exercise. It can also be turned into a GroupThink by sending all SSGs to one member who can spreadsheet the results and share them with the members.
- ♦ <u>Conference Call Roundtable Discussion</u> A fun variation on the Letter to the Shareholder exercise. Que up a portion of a conference call on one of the club's holdings. Have members note everything they heard that was important. Then go around the room and share the results. Learn from the differences.
- Article Circle All members come to the meeting with an article that provides something educational. It could be about a concept or club holding, etc. Use the education session to go around the room and let members share the finer points of their article. A good exercise to help new members participate and get comfortable speaking in front of the group.
- Multi-meeting group discussion on a book such as:
 - Take Stock by Ellis Traub (new and used available on amazon.com)
 - The Five Rules for Successful Stock Investing by Pat Dorsey
 - How to Read a Financial Report by John A. Tracy
 - The little book series such as The Little Book That Makes you Rich by Louis Navellier
 - o Or the latest in the series, The Little Book That Builds Wealth by Pat Dorsey
 - Also consider the Jim Cramer book series, such as Real Money or Mad Money
 - o The Stock Selection Guide Handbook, www.betterInvesting.org
 - o Portfolio Management Wisdom Handbook, www.betterInvesting.org
 - o Toolkit Software Manual, <u>www.lclub.com</u>

What the Libraries Have to Offer

Most of us are familiar with the library editions of Value Line, S&P Outlook, Morningstar and Mergent, but there are many more treasures hidden in the business reference shelves of our libraries, as well as on their websites. Librarians love to showcase their materials. Consider scheduling a guided tour for your club.

Not all libraries can afford to carry all of the premium subscriptions. Check other libraries online to see if you can apply for a library card at locations that do carry these publications. Also check with libraries in larger cities in your state. Many have reciprocal agreements that will allow you access to these premium sites online, using your current library card.
